- I. College Updates Dr. Jessica Berek, Dean of Health Sciences
 - A. College costs to students for next academic year
 - i. Course fees and tuition: College has proposed a variety of changes to reduce student costs, specifically regarding fees and variable tuition. The removal of course fees and the reduction of tuition from 2 times to 1.5 times will be very helpful for Nursing students - over \$1000 in savings for an average first semester student.

- B. Other financial supports for Nursing students
 - i. In addition to cost cutting measures, scholarships and PATH Grant are available to Nursing students to support attendance.
- II. Program Updates Angela Delmont, Director of Nursing
 - A. Outcomes and Current Enrollment
 - NCLEX pass rate for 2023 for Kish is 87%. (State = 85%, National = 89%)
 - 1. This is an increase from 2022 which was 83%.
 - 2. Our Expected Level of Achievement (ELA) for our nursing program accrediting body is 90%. We are currently at a 90% pass rate after all our December 2023 graduates tested.
 - Program completion rate for 2023 cohort is 60%.
 - 1. Program completion is students who successfully finish the program in 100% of the time; complete in 4 semesters. An increase from 55.3% in 2022.
 - 2. Our ELA for accreditation is 60% and the last academic year it was achieved was 2020.
 - Current student enrollment in the nursing program for Spring 2024 is 109 (1st semester 31, 2nd semester 26, 3rd semester 28, 4th semester 24).
 - B. Anticipated Fall 2024 enrollment
 - i. Received 52 applications for 40 seats. This is the first time since 2020 that the program has had alternates. There has also been an increase in program inquiries and attendance at nursing information meetings.
 - C. Future Planning LPN option for students between 1st and 2nd year
 - We are in the beginning stages of researching adding an LPN option to our current program. Kish offered an LPN option until 2016 and was eliminated due to low interest.
 - ii. This will not be a standalone program; it will likely be an option for those who would like to achieve the LPN credential on the path to achieving their RN.
- III. Group Discussion Dr. Jessica Berek, Dean of Health Sciences
 - A. Recap of last meeting
 - i. Essential Employability Skills part of the Spring 2023 meeting. Groups prioritized skills for their new employees and faculty helped use the information in their classrooms.
 - B. College efforts on employability skills
 - In August 2023, Nursing faculty and Jessica Berek presented information about essential employability skills to all Kishwaukee College Faculty. The larger group completed the same activity and

then we discussed ways to help them be more relatable to students to help them see a connection between these skills and the workforce.

C. Generational activity

 Activity completed discussing possible stereotypes of older and younger people. There was not a true consensus on any item, which helped highlight individual perceptions.

D. Student Panel

- i. A thoughtful discussion from current students in the Nursing program.
- ii. Students shared their experiences and what they are thinking about as they prepare for their future careers.
- iii. Feedback and advice shared by committee members to students.
